On the 5th May SCDC approved the designation of the Neighbourhood Plan Area of Aldringham cum Thorpe Parish. The Parish Council formally signed the agreement to continue and start the formal process of producing a Neighbourhood Plan. Details of the documents are on our website.

A drop-in session has been arranged (see above), which is the start of the process and gives an early opportunity for you to understand what a Neighbourhood Plan is all about, and share in developing our vision for the future and raise other appropriate issues to be addressed by the Plan. Please come along and have your say.

Parish matters

We still have three vacancies on the Parish Council and again if you feel you would like to contribute to the community as a councillor and would like further information please give me a call or talk to one of the other Councillors.

We still wait to hear when the Phase 2 formal consultation for Sizewell C will start but who can guess when it may be?

The Annual Parish Council Meeting took place in May when Eric Atkinson was re-elected and Chairman and David Mayhew was re-elected as Vice Chairman.

Natural England have now completed their survey of the possible routes through our parish for the Around England Coastal Path and we await the draft proposals in the autumn when they will be available for public consultation. Flooding at the entrance to Church Lane in Aldringham – As with Old Homes Road, after a number of years of discussions with county highways and a number of attempts from them to provide small soakaways, renewed pressure from residents and Church members has finally persuaded them to look at a permanent solution to the problem.

Planning

The parish council has dealt with four planning applications since the last newsletter one of which was not supported. Details of current applications can be found on our Parish Website which links through to SCDC's website.

We received the SCDC's Site Allocation and Area Specific Policies- Proposed Submissions Document in May and were surprised to see that the area of land east of Aldeburgh Road and South of the driveway to Aldringham House had been identified for development despite it being discounted in the consultation document. We have made representation to SCDC on how this has happened and await the outcome.

Traffic issues

Many of you have raised the issue of the overgrown roadside verges together with the overgrown footpaths, you may not be aware but it is the responsibility of the cutting contractor to cut the vegetation growing on the immediate verge or footpath, they are not responsible for the growth that overhangs from the side. As this has been

a particular bad (good) year for growth this has become a significant problem and can only be dealt with as resources permit.

A few weeks ago some of you may have seen in the evenings a small group of individuals working on the footpaths and verges around the crossroads at Aldringham. This was a small group of volunteers from Leiston lead by Russell Cooper who have for a couple of years been going around the area doing this kind of work. I hope you agree with me they have done a splendid job and shown that you can make a difference. Maybe they can be an inspiration to others to get involved, if it is only to improve the area around your home. If you would like to assist with tidying up the Parish please let me know. A small group has already started to carry out work in Thorpeness.

Farewell and thanks

I would like to conclude by thanking Peter Knight who took on the task of restarting and editing the newsletter just over a year ago. He edited the last three issues, but has now moved away from the area so is unable to continue. However we are very fortunate that Pippa McLardy has stepped forward to take up the baton and agreed to become the editor of the newsletter. Many thanks to Pippa.

District Council Report

Planning the future

Small areas suitable for housing development have been identified both in Aldringham (see Parish Planning update) and Thorpeness (the area between Pilgrims Way and Old Homes Road) and are included in the proposed Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies Development Plan document, which can be viewed online at www.eastsuffolk.gov.uk.

Public hearing sessions begin on August 30th at Melton Hill Council Chamber in Woodbridge when Planning Inspector Elizabeth Hill BSc(Hons) Bphil MRTPI will conduct an examination into whether this plan and another concerning the Felixstowe Peninsular area are sound.

If found to be so, the documents will guide future development and growth across the district up to 2027.

Pooch poop penalty

A man walking his dog at Sizewell has received a Fixed Penalty Notice after being spotted failing to pick up his pooch's poop. Dog walkers are reminded to take a suitable bag with them wherever they walk on public land and dispose of it in any dog waste or litter bin. Members of the public can report failure to pick up poop to 01394 444000.

Devolution - air your views

Your views are being sought by August 23rd on whether Suffolk and Norfolk should combine to create a new devolved regional authority headed by a directly elected Mayor. The Combined Authority would consist of one representative from each constituent council in the two counties, and would be an addition to, not a replacement for, existing bodies. It would receive funding of £25m each year for the next 30 years to support economic growth, development of infrastructure and jobs, £130m over five years for building new homes, £225m over four years for transport, and smaller amounts for an adult skills fund and annual apprenticeship grants. Andy Wood, Adnam's Chief Exec and independent Chair of the East Anglia Devolution Leaders Group, urges all communities to make their views known so the Secretary of State can make an informed decision in the autumn. BEE smart

Across East Anglia, 38 small and medium sized organisations have identified joint savings of over £770,500 and cut their carbon footprint by 13,997t after obtaining free advice from the BEE (Business Energy Efficiency) Anglia project. As well as a free energy audit, companies receive unbiased advice on new energy efficient products to cut energy consumption and save money. Limited grant funding is also available towards a range of equipment and technologies, and interest is expected to be high. Emanating from the European Regional Development Fund, and delivered through Suffolk and Norfolk County Councils, NWES (a not for profit enterprise agency) and Groundwork (charitable trust), local businesses with fewer than 250 employees should contact Groundwork on 01473 350370 or visit www.beeanglia.org to see if they are eligible for the project or any grant.

No flies on us

Two Suffolk Coastal residents (one from Rendlesham and one from Sax) have been given fixed penalties for fly tipping, the first in a Bromeswell layby, and the second outside Leiston Recycling Centre when it was closed. This follows new powers given to local authorities on May 9th this year to apply a fine of £200 as an alternative to prosecution (payment within 10 days reduces the fee to £120). Failure to respond to the notice within 14 days can

result in prosecution and very hefty fines or imprisonment. Report fly tippers by calling Suffolk Coastal on **01394 444000**, email scs@ncsgrp.co.uk, or go online to www.suffolkcoastal.gov.uk/yourhome/waste/fly-tipping Leiston Recycling Centre on Lovers Lane is open every day except Wednesday 9am until 5pm in summer, and 9am until 4pm October to March and can cope with a wide variety of waste.

Something fishy

Suffolk Trading Standards are warning residents to be wary of door-to-door fish sellers. Unscrupulous traders are passing off old and previously frozen stocks as fresh fish, ramping up the weights when people only wanted a small piece (in some cases to over £100 worth), using uncalibrated weighing scales and passing off cheaper varieties as more expensive fish. If in doubt, don't buy. Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline on 03454 040506 can provide advice on dealing with unwanted doorstep traders.

The great beach and village clean-up

The "Grime-Busters" would have been proud of us (*reports Bill Crow*). First the 13th Annual Beach Clean on Good Friday which managed to spread its 50 strong volunteer force to tackle not only the beach (not too bad this year – no great easterly winds) but also the village and its lovely green environs. Then on 13th April promoted by Maureen Jones we scrubbed-up Old Homes Road and Gorse Common until the Q-tips couldn't wrinkle out anymore grot. Next year's "Hyper Humungous Hygiene Fest" the Beach Clean, will take place at 10.30a.m. on Good Friday as usual, meeting at The Dolphin Inn, of course. Beats Glastonbury...

And on the subject of festivals

The moving of Aldeburgh's Music by the Sea free festival to the confines of Thorpeness Country Club grounds on July 2nd provided a 'good practice run' for a bigger and better event next year, says festival organiser and TA Hotel Collection Operations Manager Peter Osborne.

Overwhelming numbers at the Aldeburgh event last year, (estimates ranged between 10,000 and 15,000) led to fears that safety was at risk, and resulted in the change of venue and introduction of a £12 entry fee (discounted for locals).

Though reputedly 3,000 tickets were on sale, around 1,000 people turned up, but despite the influx efficient parking and traffic management kept everything moving smoothly throughout the afternoon and evening.

Twenty marshals manned the gates and kept order, and there were no reported crimes or other disturbances, although a vehicle involved in a collision opposite The Dolphin and Almshouses was not removed until 13 days later.

Those inside the grounds had food and drinks served by staff from the White Lion, Brudenell and The Dolphin. Twelve bands took to the stage, the finale provided by Coldplay tribute act Cold Place as fireworks lit up the sky above the old Kursaal building.

Next year will see more focus on families as well an addition to the number of food outlets. Addressing a frequently-heard gripe, there will be a review of the policy of not allowing picnics into the event, though for licencing reasons, taking alcohol in from outside will still be banned.

Though there was mention of an early July Saturday, the actual date of next year's event will not be finalised until (probably) September, and Peter hopes to include a Beatles tribute act and, possibly, a Blondie band.

"It was a good practice run and gave us something to build on," he said, "and can I add how appreciative I am for the support of local people, holidaymakers and the Parish Council."

We have around 26 villagers on the circulation list most of which I think are still alive (I have been doing the N W co-ordinator job for 13 years and no one has resigned!)

St Andrew's Church

Instead of giving you an update on all the things we are doing at St. Andrew's there is something else I think quite important that I want to share with you ...

As I sit here in the church (19th July) writing this article I am in the cool shade of the vestry. Outside it is 30 degrees and the Community Payback team are strimming and mowing the churchyard. The weather is very hot but they manage to keep up a steady pace of work. Likewise on the previous Saturday more than 20 people started the task of cutting and we were blessed with proper hay-raking weather; warm, dry with a gentle breeze. I'm sure they won't mind me mentioning that although many of them are over 70 they still manage to come year after year to do this task. It saddens me greatly to think that so many younger people with loved ones in the graveyard do not come and join in with us. Despite a fabulous free lunch and much advertising of the day on notice boards etc. hardly any new faces turn up. I hear nothing from them, apart, that is, from the odd irate phone call telling me the churchyard is 'disgusting' and I should be ashamed of myself letting it get so out of hand. So I have decided to take the opportunity in this article to tell you about our beautiful churchyard, and I do assure you the place is not disgusting and I am not ashamed of myself!

For just over 25 years we have managed it with advice from The Suffolk Wildlife Trust. We have one of Suffolk's best sites for Meadow Saxifrage along with Harebell, Pignut, Hairy Tare, Meadow Buttercup, Germander Speedwell and many, many others. This would not have happened if we had cut the grass to within an inch of its life all year round, also the abundant insect and other wildlife these plants encourage is wonderful to witness.

We know that by mid-June, and especially if it has been wet like this year, the whole churchyard can look uncared for, but this is NOT the case! We are simply waiting for the flowers to drop their seed and when that happens we announce the hay raking day as we did for Saturday 16th July and then we set about cutting it.

Our churchyard teems with masses of wildlife, from the humble ant to magnificent birds of prey like the Hobby. Snakes have been seen, both grass and adder, and although I know these are not to everyone's taste, they are indicative of a healthy balanced environment. If you are coming into our lovely churchyard please be aware that in all the 800 years of its existence the ground has

never EVER been flat and it is advisable to wear suitable footwear, trainers or, if wet, waterproof boots.

We do cut paths through the grass from the spring onwards especially to areas where we know people tend graves regularly. If you are having difficulty accessing a grave then I will put a phone number(s) on the church notice board and I will try to get someone to cut a path for you as soon as is possible.

At the bottom of the existing churchyard we have been gifted nearly an acre of land by the Ogilvie family for future burials, as we don't need this just at the moment we have planted it with wild flowers and it looks stunning. At first it was a mass of white with a few touches of blue and red, then almost overnight it turned bright yellow and now there is a strong hint of blue showing through. The air is filled with the buzzing and humming of insects, butterflies and dragonflies flit over this kaleidoscopic landscape, and the whole place, whilst vibrating with life, is very peaceful and calm.

Come and have a look if you like - you'll be most welcome.

The Ogilvie Pavilion and Sports Ground

If you have been driving past the entrance to the Thorpeness Pavilion and Sports Field recently, you may have noticed it looking a little different; a new lick of white paint on the walls, which we feel is more in keeping with the village than the pink, and a lovely new patio at the front of it.

Out are the old tatty brick walls that were planted up with geraniums, and in are planters on the patio and revamped picnic benches. This should all make a lovely backdrop as we enter into another summer of events. When the Ogilvie Trust hand over the field and pavilion to the new charity trust (hopefully by autumn), we will start to do some much needed work on the inside of the pavilion. Cricket continues as usual, with some matches scheduled for the summer and there is always practice at the nets most Sunday afternoons and Tuesday evenings (see board at the gate for details).

Last year we restarted the 'drinks and nibbles' on Sunday lunchtimes which were very popular, and we hope to continue with them again during some Sundays in August. Please see village notice boards for dates.

On August 28th, Bank Holiday Sunday, we will be holding a classics car rally from noon onwards (see advertisement opposite) which will be preceded by a car boot sale from 9.00am. Hopefully the booters will stay on for the rest of the afternoon as there will be more stalls, food outlets and a bouncy castle for all to enjoy, and entrance will be free.

Some of you may also have noticed some large metal containers at the back of the field near the cricket nets. These will eventually become the home of the relocated Aldeburgh Rifle Club, which hopefully will be changing its name to the Thorpeness Rifle Club soon. The containers will be clad with black weatherboarding to fit in with the rest of the buildings on the field

The Thorpeness Croquet Club is already very active holding tournaments as well as playing for pleasure several afternoons during the week. They hope to have some of their members playing during the Bank Holiday Sunday Classics/car boot day and everyone is welcome to come and have a try. Full supervision will be given.

Along with Tea and Toast and the activities the Pavilion Trustees put on, we also have a model airplane club who fly on the field when weather permits, and a group of war gamers who meet most Monday afternoons. Wendy Sturmeys fun quizzes run every other Wednesday evening from April to October.

All in all, the Pavilion is increasingly busy - we even had a wedding take place on the field this July. It is the intention of the Trustees to keep this wonderful facility open for the Parish and we have a website and contact number should you consider using it yourself in the future.
