Cliff Collapse Tragedy

Many local parishioners will have their whereabouts etched on their minds when the sound of sirens and the rattle of helicopters broke the peace of an ordinary Saturday lunchtime on January 14th. Some dropped everything and hurried to see what was amiss, and whether they could help.

On the beach, around 50 people including local fire, police, ambulance, coastguard and lifeboat crews, were digging frantically – some with bare hands - to try to save the life of a dog walker from a village near Bury St Edmunds buried beneath tons of cliff, made unstable by weather and waves, which had crashed down on to him. Tragically, they were unsuccessful.

The inquest that resumes on June 1st may have recommendations to make, although protecting people against the forces of nature will always be an uphill battle. But in attempts to prevent any future tragedies, the landowner has had a fence constructed well away from the edge on the common land at the top of the cliff, and Norse is in the process of erecting warning signs on the beach at its base. Local people can play their part by ensuring that all their visitors are warned of the very real danger of further cliff falls.

The Parish extends deepest sympathy to the family and friends of the man who died, and sincere thanks to all who tried so desperately to save him.

Parish Council News to mid-March 2017

Neighbourhood Plan (NP)

With the new year we have started to look at the aspirations, ideas and concerns raised last year and how they can be taken forward and inform further consultation to be carried out during the coming year, before a questionnaire can be presented to the Parish. This will be an opportunity for everyone in the Parish to have a say as to how important particular issues are to them. There were a number of things raised that were not relevant to a Neighbourhood plan, but no less import to the parish, these items will be included in an updated Parish Plan which was first produced in 2006.

There is now a TAB on our Parish website for the Neighbourhood Plan, were the latest information on progress can be found.

Parish Matters

PC Vacancies

We still have two vacancies on the Parish Council and there is a chance to get involved with the Neighbourhood Plan. If you feel you would like to contribute to the community in either of these roles please give me a call or talk to one of the other councillors or a member of the NP team. Also, help is needed in Aldringham to work on the Parish Emergency plan. Are you interested?

Sizewell C

A number of us attended the numerous meetings and drop in events which were held during the Sizewell C Stage 2 consultation process before we submitted our response to the consultation at the beginning of February. The response gave a particular focus on legacy and benefit which seems to be largely absent from EDF's current thinking. Suffolk Coastal District Council provided their own response, emphasising their disappointment at the lack of information EDF have provided.

Coastal Path

Work on the route of the around England coastal path has now been completed in our parish and GPS mapping of the route is now being carried out before the details are published for consultation in the next couple of months.

Fly Tipping

We have had a number of instances of Fly tipping in the Parish over the last few months including garden waste, household items and builder's rubbish. Last year increased penalties were introduced as described in our August newsletter (available on the website). Planning

The parish council has dealt with eight planning applications since the last newsletter one of which was not supported. Details of the current applications can be found via the Parish Website which links through to SCDC's website.

The results of the review of SCDC's Site Allocation and Area Specific Policies- Proposed Submissions Document have now been published confirming the inspector did not recommend any changes to the plan regarding the inclusion of Site SSP4 - the area of land in Aldringham east of Aldeburgh Road and South of the driveway to Aldringham House. This was despite strong representation from the Parish Council, and a number of Parishioners. The Site Allocation and Area Specific Policies has now been issued by SCDC. Although I believe in this fast-changing world SCDC are starting a new review of the Local Plan and its supporting documentation, which I am sure will lead to the identification of more houses to be built in the District over the next 15 years.

With regard to the land in Thorpeness west of Old Homes Road, as many of you will have seen, work has started on clearing the area and the developer tells me he hopes work will start on the ten new homes in April. Orwell housing have shown the Parish Council and residents at the Thorpeness Almshouse, an outline proposal to build an additional 16 dwellings in a similar style to the existing building at the back of the Almshouses where the gardens are currently located.

Traffic Matters

Proposals by Suffolk Highways for speed limit changes on the B1122 between Aldringham & Aldeburgh were submitted to committee on the 7th March. They voted unanimously to adopt the 40mph limit. There were 92 letters of support and four against.

It is hoped that the signs will be in place by June.

District Council Annual Report

Move to Riduna Park

Suffolk Coastal moved into new purpose-built office premises at Riduna Park in Melton from the previous ageing offices at Melton Hill, Woodbridge. Downsizing to reduce the Council's running costs and to give staff more efficient and modern facilities to work in, the new offices provide a contemporary and comfortable environment and allow for improved flexible working for both staff and members. A one-stop shop at Woodbridge Library now provides the first point of contact for a wide range of enquiries regarding many Council services, including council tax, housing benefits, and tourism.

Merger

Appointing a joint Chief Executive in 2008 for Suffolk Coastal and Waveney District Council has been key to making efficiency savings.

In January, Cabinets at both councils approved the proposals for a full merger at a cabinet meeting followed by a SCDC Full Council meeting on the 26th January, a day after Waveney councillors had voted in favour. Both Council Leaders recognised the significance of this decision. Plans were approved to create a brand new 'super district' council, delivering services to communities across east Suffolk, and the parties will now work with the Department of Communities and Local Government to begin the formal process of merger. With the Secretary of State's agreement, the new Council would then hold elections, and begin operations, in 2019.

By creating a new, larger and more influential council, w costs will be kept down down, enabling maintenance and improvement of the services that local people depend on. Working in partnership has already helped the Councils save over £16m since 2010. However, further savings cannot be made unless the partnership progresses further. A new, merged, council will be better placed to address the shared challenges that both face. Final ratification of the decision will be made by the Secretary of State in September 2017.

Protecting the tax payer

SCDC has vowed to develop a more commercial approach to providing services, in order to protect the local tax payer. At its Full Council meeting on the 23rd February, SCDC agreed its budget and set its portion of the Council Tax for the coming financial year. In order to continue to provide high quality services, the Council

decided to increase its part of the Council Tax bill for 2017/18 by 3.25%. In real money, this equates to an annual rise of less than £5 for people living in a Band D property, with the Council Tax on Band D increasing by £4.95 from £152.37 to £157.32 a year.....or by less than 10p a week.

SCDC Leader Ray Herring said joint savings (with Waveney) of £16m had been made since 2010, but steep reductions in Central Government grants (from ££7.4m in 2010/11 to £600,000 in 2017/18) would lead to a projected budget gap of £2.1m in 2018/19, so reductions in spending and increases in efficiency would be needed to make up the shortfall.

Leisure Centres set for transformation

SCDC has announced a five-year programme to update its leisure centres. Deben will be first to be upgraded, followed by Leiston. Disruption will be kept to a minimum, and local communities kept informed of progress.

Civil Parking Enforcement in East Suffolk.

There is mounting discontent about unpoliced illegal parking in the District, and Suffolk is one of few counties where enforcing parking regulations still falls to the police as opposed to the district councils. Implementing Civil Parking Enforcement would allow SCDC to take action, including providing options for on-street pay and display and provision of new car parking facilities. Income from ticket sales could make the scheme self-funding. Work is underway to implement the change, but in the meantime transgressors should still be reported to police.

Revitalising the Suffolk Coast

A new volunteer tourism project run by Wild Days Conservation Holidays has been established and aims to link volunteering with holidaying opportunities along the Suffolk coast. Supported by Suffolk Coast & Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB), three holidays have now taken place in Dunwich, Orford and Walberswick and four more are planned for this year. The development of these holidays is part of a wider 'Volunteer Tourism' project to help both local volunteers and visitors to pass on their passion for the Suffolk coast.

This links to the Suffolk Coast Greeters project to form the Volunteer Tourism Network which recruits volunteers to welcome visitors to the area who will share what they love, what they know and their personal experiences of the area. The Suffolk Coast website, launched in April 2015 by the The Suffolk Coast Ltd Destination Management Organisation (DMO) has details.

Four new walks with improved route marking and new guides have been developed for the four paths in Aldeburgh & Thorpeness, Rendlesham & Staverton, Sutton & Hollesley Heaths and Walberswick to enable people to navigate the routes easily and safely.

The AONB team launched the newly renovated coast path in Walberswick on 24th February, along with the collection of guides to link the best walks in the area.

Free Wifi and computer access mapped

There is now a digital map, the first of its type in the County, showing free PC and Wi-Fi locations in east Suffolk, including children's centres, libraries, Citizens

Advice Bureaux and Jobcentres. Each icon provides detail on the level of service offered at each location such as free Wi-Fi and computer access as well as access to IT training and support.

New noise service

There are around 500 complaints annually to SCDC's Environmental Protection Team regarding noise nuisance. Residents are asked to behave considerately, particularly during summer months when windows are open and people are enjoying their gardens. But if you are affected by exceptional noise nuisance, be it an incessantly barking dog, loud music, or noise from adjacent businesses, officers can be contacted through SCDC's weekend/evening hotline on: 01502 527132 or during the normal working hours on: 01502 562111.

Right to rent checks

Since last year all private landlords, including anyone sub-letting or taking in lodgers, are required to carry out quick and simple checks on new tenants to make sure they have the right to rent property in the country. Landlords should check and take copies of some among a wide range of identity documents, designed to accommodate different circumstances and not reliant solely on traditional identity documents such as a passport. Raising funds

There are two sources of funding for local groups available through SCDC. The Enabling Communities Exemplar Programme (*no, still no idea - ed*) can make grants of between £1,000 and £10,000 for flagship projects or activities supported by a local councillor, and The Enabling Communities Budget is a set amount (currently £6,500) which an individual councillor can choose to spend where they see fit on local projects.

St Andrew's Church

Isn't it wonderful to see through the dull murkiness of winter hints of things to come? Little clusters of bright white snowdrops, followed by glorious golden and purple crocuses and now lemon yellow daffodils, are a sure sign that spring, the season of new growth, is upon us. The churchyard at St. Andrew's, probably like your garden, is beginning to renew itself.

No matter how bad the winter or whatever conditions the weather extremes like 'Storm Doris' throw at us we seem to be able to overcome most situations and carry on. The church building of St. Andrews is a bit like that, there were times in the past when it became a roofless ruin with its tower fallen and the only regular visitors were cows using it for shelter. Then spring came in the form of the Gannon family and others who enabled it to be rebuilt and refurbished to virtually what we see today.

Whilst on the face of it the church seems to be doing well, we do have a problem that is quietly nagging away at us. We have lost, through unavoidable personal reasons, some very key members of our congregation, namely our three elders. These people worked incredibly hard helping take services and in the general day to day running of the church, and whilst we will hopefully in time have new elders it is becoming increasingly obvious that we are not having new people join our congregation. We try to offer an 'across the board' selection of services ranging from the traditional to the more modern and as a result of a meeting we held recently we will be looking into providing even more different types of worship. Not all services are

held within the body of the church. Some services, like our Sunrise service on Easter Sunday start on Thorpeness beach and end up in the Country Club, while our Animal Service, usually the first Sunday in August, takes place in the churchyard - a most beautiful setting. Once a month on a Sunday afternoon we enjoy a tasty snack of tea and toast whilst discussing all sorts of current and relevant issues. The venue for this is The Ogilvie Pavilion, idyllically set on the sports field in direct view of the iconic 'House in the Clouds and windmill, about as far from a church building as you can get. Yet this is still a form of worship and outreach.

But what we really need is YOU! We have many friends at the church who do so much for us but who don't wish to be in the congregation. If we aren't offering the type of worship you would like, come and talk to us. I'm sure our priest, the Revd. Mark Lowther and his assistant priest the Revd. Sheila Hart will be only too pleased to listen and discuss with you your thoughts and needs. We are always here for you!

We have a very special day coming up on Saturday the 15th July. The Bishop of Dunwich, Bishop Mike, is coming to consecrate our new burial ground. It will be a day of great celebration and we would love you to come and share it with us. This is a true sign that our church will be a part of the community for years to come, and there is NO CHANCE of St. Andrews becoming neglected and its only visitors a herd of cows seeking shelter. Perish the thought!!!

Since renewing the offer of transport to hospital, 16 requests for journeys to Ipswich medical centres have been carried out, and an enquiry was made concerning trips to James Paget Hospital as well. This has now been approved. The suggested donation will be £25 for a round trip to Ipswich (£50 if separate volunteers are used for trips to and from the hospital), and £30 to James Paget. The volunteer should feel justified in keeping this payment to cover the basic cost of fuel and wear and tear. Where the charge for a medically-related journey would cause financial hardship to the passenger, the volunteer driver can apply to the GN Steering Group for payment. Pro rata payments (at approximately 45p per mile) will be applied for other journeys.

Any volunteer prepared to make the journey may apply to the Steering Group for a Volunteer Parking Permit at Ipswich NHS Hospital. These are specific to one vehicle. Contact the GN helpline for a renewal form.

Thorpeness and Aldringham Heritage Group



This could be a landmark year for the Thorpeness and Aldringham Heritage group (TAHG). For a while now we have been having talks with SCDC regarding the use of a piece of scrub land in the car park near to The Meare which we would like to lease. Our hope is to erect a small building in the style of a fisherman's hut on this waste land that will enable us to have a presence in the village. We want it to be a small visitors' centre, a place of information for those who want to know more about Thorpeness, Aldringham and their surroundings and also about their fascinating and unique history. This small building will precede a larger one that we want to erect on some adjacent land which will eventually house a more permanent home for us.

We have another four interpretative boards almost ready to be put up around Thorpeness, and along with existing boards these will create a walking trail. We are hoping that these will be in place for the start of the holiday season. These are a popular amenity with visitors and locals alike.

A Brief History of Thorpeness Almshouses

Thorpeness Almshouses have been administered by the Margaret Ogilvie Almshouses Trust since they were built in 1926 to a design by W.G.Wilson. The central arch with a common room above, an attractive wood-panelled tower room, was completed two years later. The 12 one-bedroomed houses were built as staff residences, especially for older Ogilvie employees.

They were improved in the mid-1960s when bathrooms were built, and again later when en suites were added. In 2005, management of the houses was taken over by the Orwell Housing Association, and a considerable refurbishment followed. This included rewiring, secondary double glazing, insulation, converting bathrooms into wet rooms and the reroofing of the whole structure.

Early maps indicate that the Almshouses are on the site of a mediaeval chapel, possibly known as St Mary's. This was situated immediately to the east of the houses, and some villagers can remember some standing masonry near the position of The Matron's House. Perhaps the road running through the Almshouses is named Pilgrim's Way due to the proximity of the chapel. There has been some evidence of burial activity in the area, with human bones including skulls being found when footings for the Almshouse extensions were dug.

Currently, consternation is being felt by residents over early-stage proposals suggesting the construction of a number of new dwellings to the rear of the existing building.

Healthwatch Suffolk finds out what local people think about NHS and social care services and has powers to influence and improve them for the future. This is an important finding as some people with diabetes develop foot ulcers or infections that are one of the leading causes of amputation in the UK.
