MY DEAR PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS.

I must say just one final word re the repairs recently carried out in our Church. The debt has now been reduced to about £17. The Church Expenses Account shows a sufficient balance in hand to pay off this amount, but, at the moment, we hesitate to do so as it would put an undue strain upon that Account. A certain sum must be kept in hand to meet current expenses. Also, in order to pay our Quota in full, £10 is still needed, the greater part of which must be reckoned as Church Expenses, so that every penny given to our Freewill Offering Fund is helping to liquidate the debt. Now that the end of our liability has practically come, to God be all the praise.

Owing to the fact that the Rev. H. J. Cossar did not act as my locum this summer, we have not yet had our annual sermons at Aldringham on behalf of the British and Foreign Bible Society. I am hoping to remedy this by having collections on Sunday, October 15, at all the Services for this object. On Tuesday, the 17th, the newly-appointed District Secretary, the Rev. G. Daunt, will give an address on behalf of the Society in the Parish Room at 7.30 p.m. I hope that a goodly company will be present to welcome him on his first visit to the parish.

The Harvest Thanksgiving at Thorpeness took place on September 10. Though the number present in

the evening was not quite so good as usual (owing, perhaps, to the very fine day), financially it was a great success, the total amount contributed for the Ipswich Hospital being £3 16s. 7d. The Church presented a very festive appearance, not only having been beautifully decorated with corn, flowers fruit, etc., but we were reminded of our dependance also upon the waters for our food by a fishing net tastefully draped across the Church, and displaying specimens of the harvest of the sea. I am most grateful to all those who took such great pains to make our Church look so beautiful.
